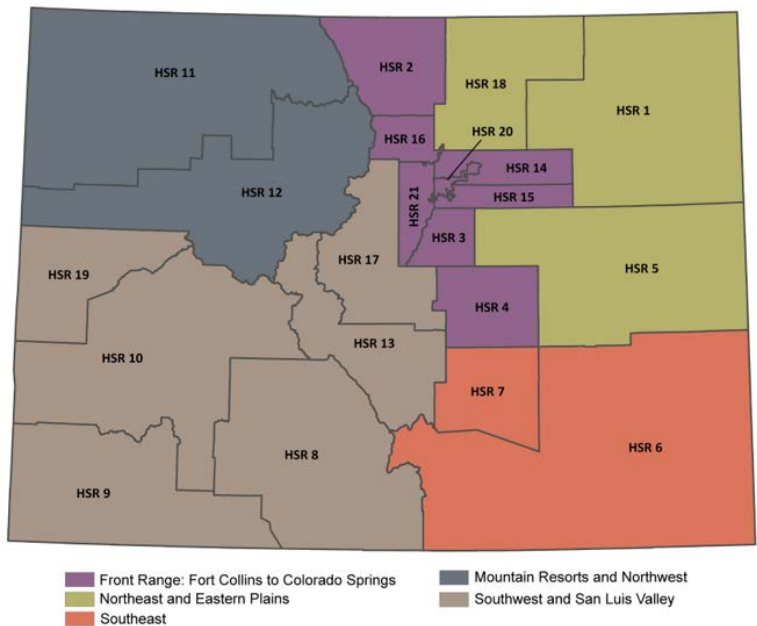

This data was derived from CHI estimates of non-elderly Coloradans (ages 0 to 64) who are eligible but not enrolled (EBNE) in a Connect for Health Colorado plan using Advanced Premium Tax Credits (APTCs). The values are up to date as of the end of the 2016 open enrollment period (OE3), though additional enrollees may sign up throughout the year if they have a qualifying life event. "APTC Uninsured EBNE" only includes Coloradans who are uninsured. Note: CHI provided Connect for Health Colorado a zip-code analysis which was modified to provide a geographic "crosswalk" of County-level estimates.
